
Celebrating 25 Years of Catholic Education

This 2022-2023 school year marks 25 years for Archbishop Edward A. McCarthy High School. We celebrate a quarter century of our commitment to providing excellence in Catholic education and service to our community. We proudly celebrate this milestone as we continue to grow and embrace a mission of innovation in Catholic education.

Seeing the need for a Catholic high school in South Broward, the Archdiocese of Miami authorized the construction and Archbishop Edward McCarthy, the school's namesake, began planning for the new school. They broke ground in 1997 and began the first phase of construction which included a 21-room classroom building, a 300 seat chapel, a gymnasium & locker rooms, and three fields to accommodate 800 students. August 1998 was the start of the first school year with Dr. Richard Perhla as principal and Fr. Edmond Whyte as supervising principal. The second phase of construction was completed in 2002 which included two new buildings with nineteen additional classrooms, a media center, fine arts theatre, computer labs and offices. 2002 also brought the celebration of the first baccalaureate mass and graduation ceremony.

Much has changed since those first years. Fr. Brendan Dalton was appointed supervising principal in 2005, and Richard P. Jean was appointed as the new principal in 2010. Those five years in between saw the addition of the Student Center, the Fitness Center, and the main stadium and bleachers. 2011 brought the introduction of iPads for teaching and learning, and the school earned the recognition of being an Apple Distinguished School in 2012. That same year, the iCatholicEd room was built and a security office was added. 2015 brought the groundbreaking for the Alex Avila Athletic Center and the addition of the College Advisement office. More recent improvements include the access control entry for all interior and exterior doors, the addition of a medic and clinic, synthetic turf on the main field, and the renovation of the chemistry lab.

The school continues to grow with our student population now over 1700, and the campus continues to change and evolve to meet their needs. We look forward to the next 25 years as we continue our mission of innovation in Catholic education and work to prepare our students for the future.



Archbishop John C. Favalora, Archbishop McCarthy and the first supervising principal, Reverend Edmond Whyte, broke ground for the new school on April 27, 1997. The first phase of construction began soon after. This initial phase included a 21-room classroom building (including offices for campus ministry and student activities, computer lab and three science labs), a 300-seat chapel, an air-conditioned gymnasium and locker rooms and three athletic fields to accommodate 800 students.

Archbishop John C. Favalora selected the name of this new school to be Archbishop Edward A. McCarthy High School in honor of the contributions made to the Roman Catholic community, including education, by Archbishop McCarthy. Archbishop McCarthy was born on April 10, 1918 in Cincinnati, Ohio, and was given eternal rest on June 6, 2005.









Archbishop Edward A. McCarthy, our school's namesake, led the Archdiocese of Miami from 1977 to his retirement in 1994, a 17-year period during which the population of South Florida boomed. During his tenure, Archbishop McCarthy oversaw the establishment and building of new parishes and churches in South Florida, including the parish of St. Mark the Evangelist in 1985. In his final year, Archbishop McCarthy helped to plan the creation of a much-needed Catholic high school in western Broward County. When ground was broken for the building of the school in April 1997, then Archbishop John C. Favalora named it Archbishop Edward A. McCarthy High School in honor of the many contributions the Archbishop made to the Roman Catholic community in South Florida and to other dioceses which he served. Our school's motto *Manere in Dilectione Christi*—"To abide in the love of Christ"—was also Archbishop McCarthy's personal motto and serves as the inspiration for members of the Archbishop McCarthy family to emulate his life of service to the Catholic Church.

Monsignor Edmund Whyte was Archbishop McCarthy's first supervising principal, from its founding in 1996 up to 2004. Born in Ireland's County Kerry, Monsignor Whyte came to the United States as a priest in 1964 and served at various parishes in South Florida for over 50 years. Known as the Church Builder, Monsignor Whyte oversaw the building of three churches in the parishes he led. As pastor at Our Lady of the Lakes parish in Miami Lakes, Monsignor Whyte, along with founding principal Sister Carol M. Koester, opened Our Lady of the Lakes Elementary School in 1987. Moving on to St. Mark the Evangelist parish in 1996, Monsignor Whyte was instrumental in the building of the parish's church and the high school next door—Archbishop McCarthy. Yet, despite his tireless dedication and extraordinary effort in strengthening South Florida's Roman Catholic community, Monsignor Whyte remained the modest, self-effacing priest beloved by those who knew him well.





THE SCHOOL CREST, MOTTO AND COLORS

The crest of Archbishop Edward A. McCarthy High School reflects the heritage and traditions of its namesake. In the right corner of the triangle is a stag trippant, which represents the McCarthy family and was used in Ireland as a symbol for centuries and is symbolic of Archbishop McCarthy's patron saints, St. Edward the Confessor and St. Anthony. The "M" and the three crosslets are from the Coat of Arms of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati, where Archbishop McCarthy was born, baptized, ordained to the priesthood and later received Episcopal ordination and is symbolic of the Blessed Mother. The palm and three waves are the symbols of the Archdiocese of Miami. The crown on the top of the triangle is the symbol for the special intentions granted to the school by the Blessed Mother.

Our school's motto is *Manere in Dilectione Christi*, translated as "To abide in the love of Christ".

It is derived from the words of Our Lord at the Last Supper (John 15:9) and expresses the Lord's teaching, "He who abides in me, and I in him, he bears much fruit; for without me you can do nothing." (John 15:5); "If you keep my commandments you will abide in my love" (John 15:10); and "By this will all men know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:35). This motto is an ideal and program of life for the bearers of this shield.

Our school colors are Teal Blue, Silver and Black.

THE SCHOOL MASCOT





Since Archbishop McCarthy opened its doors to students in 1998, the school has attracted a wealth of talented teachers, coaches, and support staff who have helped it become one of the top Catholic high schools in the nation in less than 20 years.

Currently, there are more than 20 professionals who have "worked" at Archbishop McCarthy for more than 20 years. Why the quotes? In 2005, Father Brendan Dalton became Archbishop McCarthy’s second supervising principal and one of the school’s most ardent champions.

Like Monsignor Whyte, Father Dalton came from Ireland’s County Kerry to South Florida, where he served until his death in 2017.

At the many school Masses Father Dalton celebrated at Archbishop McCarthy, he inspired all present with his moving stories about people whose faith in God and love for Jesus Christ sustained them in life’s most difficult times. Encouraging students to maintain an “attitude of gratitude” for their many blessings, Father Dalton was a welcome figure on campus who almost never forgot a face. And no one was prouder of Archbishop McCarthy’s academic excellence and leading role in using technology to improve student learning than Father Dalton.

While acknowledging that today’s classrooms are markedly different from the classrooms of his school days, Father Dalton celebrated the fact that Archbishop McCarthy was consistently recognized as a School of Excellence by the Catholic Education Honor Roll.



The foundation of any Catholic institution is Jesus Christ Himself. Yet it was individuals like Archbishop McCarthy, Monsignor Whyte, and Father Dalton, whose lives were dedicated to emulating Jesus’s example of love and compassion for all, who built Archbishop McCarthy into the successful Catholic high school it is today.







Students are introduced to McCarthy’s Roman Catholic atmosphere from the moment they arrive on campus.

On their first day, freshmen are welcomed by members of Link Crew, with the goals of acclimating students to campus life and making sure that they know they will always have a place in McCarthy’s Catholic family. Faculty member Ms. Claudia Curtis, who along with Mrs. Melissa Chriswesser moderates the Link Crew program, notes that

Link Crew “is first and foremost rooted in kindness as well as silliness. In the welcome speech I greet our newest Mavericks with each year, I tell them that each of them is exactly who McCarthy needs them to be. We want to ensure that all freshmen feel that they belong, that they are valued, and that they will be seen and heard from their very first day at our school.”

Of course, Catholicism is woven into Archbishop McCarthy’s academic curriculum also. In keeping with the Catholic Church’s rich tradition of religious scholarship,



Archbishop McCarthy’s four years of Theology courses are aimed at giving students not only a thorough understanding of their faith but also guidance on how to practice it in their daily lives. In their coursework, freshmen learn about the foundations of Catholicism by studying the Old and New Testaments. Sophomore Theology courses focus on the Life, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus Christ and the establishment of the Church dedicated to continuing Christ’s ministry. Junior Theology courses cover the Sacramental Life of the Church and the moral and ethical principles that form the basis of Catholic Christianity. Seniors study the history of the Church and its relationship to other world religions. “In all of McCarthy’s Theology classes,”

notes Theology Department Chair Chris Covone, “the practical aspect of Catholicism is emphasized. We want students to not only understand what the Church teaches but also why it teaches what it teaches, and how these teachings apply to daily life.”



Archbishop McCarthy’s hugely popular retreat program provides students more opportunities to grow in their faith and to strengthen their ties to the school community. Each class has its own retreat that is structured around the particular level of faith development of students in each grade. “By stepping back from their daily routines,” Mr. Covone notes, “students learn more about themselves, their faith, and what it means to live as Catholics in high school and beyond.” Depending on the student’s grade level, retreats are 1-3 days long and are held both on and off campus. Junior and senior students may be selected as Peer Ministers, responsible for planning and leading retreats under the supervision of faculty moderators. Many McCarthy alumni recall their participation in school retreats as one of their most memorable high school experiences. “Through the retreats, I was able to strengthen my faith and also the relationships with those

around me,” affirms Gianna Fernandez, Class of 2020. “It was one of the best experiences I had in high school.” Alejandro Machado, also Class of 2020, recalls that “as a retreat leader, I was able to express myself creatively and emotionally while learning essential leadership skills.” “McCarthy retreats allowed students to be emotionally vulnerable in a Catholic environment that is inherently supportive,” 2019 graduate Amanda Alvarez recalls.

“Christian life is for service,” stated Pope Francis in a 2019 sermon. Archbishop McCarthy’s many service clubs provide ample opportunities for students to “seek the common good and well-being of all, especially the poor and vulnerable.” McCarthy’s Ministry Clubs, some of which have been established by students themselves, based on their particular passions and interests, serve the neediest in our community, including the poor, the homeless, and the elderly, as well as those who live with physical and emotional disabilities. Students also serve within the school at monthly masses—as Eucharistic ministers, lectors, musicians and ushers. Many of the school’s athletic teams and honor societies perform their own service projects, such as raising money for a charity and collecting food, clothing, school supplies, and toys for the needy and for those affected by natural disasters.

“The Catholic Atmosphere at Archbishop McCarthy High School is physically visible, with crucifixes in each classroom and Bible verses posted around campus,” observes Mr. Covone. “And while these are important, the Catholic atmosphere is actually created by putting our faith into practice, in both large and small ways every day; service to others is how our love for God grows.” It is this mission that serves as Archbishop McCarthy High School’s foundation, as essential to the building as the first stone laid down 25 years ago.



Byron Walker has served as Head Football Coach, and for the past 3 years, as Director of Athletics.

Coach Walker states proudly, "It has been a pleasure working with our coaches and athletes in continuing the excellence of our Maverick athletic programs. We are successful and respected throughout the state."

In 1998-1999, our athletes laid the groundwork for what was to come. In 2001, our women's tennis team made school history by winning our first ever district championship. Since our inaugural district title, our dedicated coaches and athletes have accomplished the following: won 104 district team titles, 42 regional team titles, 12 team state championships (7 in baseball, 3 in women's golf, 1 in women's soccer, and 1 in men's volleyball) 8 team state runner-up titles, and 11 individual state titles.

Our teams also won multiple national titles: 2 National Titles in baseball, 1 FCDA National Title in Dance, and 2 individual National Titles in Wrestling.

Overall, the varsity sports program has maintained a winning percentage throughout school history of over 70 percent.

In 2017-2018, our winter and spring teams, and in 2018-2019, our fall, winter and




spring teams were named FHSAA Overall 6A Team Academic Champions. Our varsity teams achieved an un-weighted GPA of 3.0 or higher. The athletic department is very proud of these accomplishments as our coaches and athletes work diligently to maintain the values, philosophies, and academic standards of Archbishop McCarthy High School.

sports and other extra curricular activities. We are extremely proud to have such a large portion of our student body competing and participating. Our programs provide you with an excellent opportunity to join the team.




