

## "Progress is impossible without change."

Beginning in the 2023-2024 school year, Archbishop McCarthy transitioned to the president / principal model of administration, joining other Catholic high schools in the area that have also adopted this model. The movement away from the traditional "principal only" administrative structure follows a trend seen in Catholic high schools throughout the United States. As secondary school education has evolved and the needs of students have changed, many Catholic high schools have responded by realigning their leadership teams to ensure their schools' operational efficiency.

In the broadest sense, the president /

principal model is aimed at strengthening the financial stability of schools by enabling the president to focus on institutional advancement and securing educational resources while the principal supervises curriculum and instruction, as well as the day-to-day operations of the school. The roles of school leaders will surely overlap, however, and every school will structure its administrative team to best meet its unique needs. But as research makes clear, what is essential for the success of this administrative model is a high degree of mutual trust between president and principal, a shared commitment to the school's mission, and

frequent face-to-face communication. Because Archbishop McCarthy is blessed to have as its President and Principal long-time colleagues and good friends Richard Jean and Kevin Molina, the transition has been seamless.

Richard and Kevin's professional relationship goes back to 2000 when Richard was the Dean of Students and Assistant Principal at St. Coleman F. Carroll High School, where Kevin taught in the Social Studies Department. "I was in charge of Student Government, so Richard and I collaborated on school activities," recalls Kevin. "Working with Richard gave me my first experience in school administration." When Richard was appointed principal of Archbishop McCarthy in 2010, he encouraged Kevin, who had earned a Master's degree in Educational Leadership, to join him as Dean of Students in 2011. But, as Kevin points out, their relationship is more deeply rooted: "We are both products of









Catholic education, having attended Catholic elementary and high schools. We believe in the teachings and values of the Catholic Church, which is why we have dedicated our careers to Catholic education." Asked to compare their leadership styles, they agree that they both take their jobs very seriously and always keep in mind that teachers, students, and staff members depend on them to make wise decisions. "It's important to remain focused on what we do," Kevin notes, "because we cannot let down those we serve." Their vision for the future of Archbishop McCarthy is the same, Kevin emphasizes. "We want Archbishop McCarthy to continue as a school that provides educational opportunities for everyone."

## The Play's the Thing...

The award-winning Archbishop McCarthy High School Drama Department mounted yet another successful fall production with its presentation of "The Curious Savage," a play at once funny and touching, eliciting both laughter and tears from audiences. Director Nicholas Palazzo (Archbishop McCarthy Class of 2016) observes that the play's theme is centered around the idea that human beings need to listen for the "hundreds of ways" we say "I love you" to those around us, whether that message is conveyed in words or actions.










Performed over four nights to sold-out crowds, the production received exceptional reviews from the South Florida Cappie critics. The Cappies, the Tony Awards for high schools, is a year-long program for theatre and journalism students through which students attend and discuss each other's shows, write reviews for publication, and, at season's end, honor student performers and technicians with Cappies. Mr. Palazzo expressed pride in his cast and crew and confidently noted that they are "looking forward to awards season in the spring." "The students worked incredibly hard," said Mr. Palazzo. "The production was an experience that will be remembered for years to come."



# Maverick Tech Ambassadors Featured at ADOM Professional Day Workshop

On Oct. 6, Archbishop McCarthy, one of six Apple Schools of Distinction in the Archdiocese of Miami, hosted a variety of workshops as part of the Archdiocese of Miami Schools' Professional Day. Teachers from elementary and high schools throughout the Archdiocese came to our campus to enhance their knowledge of the best strategies for teaching 21st century students. Presenters included faculty from Apple Distinguished Schools in the Archdiocese as well as professionals from such educational support services as Kahoot and Magma Math.

Santilli conducted a hands-on digital
art experience to demonstrate how
the Photo Shop app can be used in the
classroom to inspire innovation and
creativity for students and teachers.
Claudia Curtis, Jeanne Ferrier, and
Hartley Pawloski, members of the

McCarthy faculty and administration, presented workshops on how to maximize the potential of the widely-used Canvas Learning Management System (LMS), and similar systems, for school-wide communication, faculty training, and organizing the activities of sports teams, clubs, and honor societies.

But the stars of this technological showcase were Archbishop McCarthy's Tech Ambassadors, an elite group of students whose technical prowess enables them to provide iPad training to incoming freshmen at summer workshops as well as troubleshoot iPad glitches their peers might experience during the school year. These students, under the guidance of Archbishop McCarthy's Tech Mentors Mrs. Monica Arango and Mrs. Melissa Chriswisser, spent long hours over a five-week period creating a unique Apple Playground that enabled teachers to explore ways in which iOS apps such as Photos, Clips, iMovie, and Keynote can be used in classrooms to enhance student learning.

The McCarthy students' ability to innovate and collaborate on designing activities that engaged teachers, administrators, and even Apple representatives "blew everyone away," Mrs. Arango marveled. Led by first-year coach Dino Mangiero, the Archbishop McCarthy varsity football team was undefeated this season, beating teams from Broward, Miami-Dade, Palm Beach, and Monroe counties. The McCarthy offense, which outscored its opponents by over 200 points, featured stellar performances by the quarterback and a corps of running backs and wide receivers, many of whom were freshmen and sophomores.

The coaches are especially appreciative of the "terrific support" the team received throughout the year and are confident that the team will have a great season next year also.





The Archbishop McCarthy Men's and Women's Bowling teams enjoyed another successful season in 2023. The women's team returned to the state championship tournament and finished 19th, a school high. Competing as an individual at the state championships, senior Anderson Albury finished among the top 15 bowlers in the tournament, Archbishop

McCarthy's best individual place ever. Coach Enzo Grossi was impressed by his teams' effort. "Our teams are young but show great promise for the future." The coach also commended the camaraderie of his bowlers.

"The kids on this bowling team really have a great time together. They cheer each other on and build up one another every time we bowl. It has been a pleasure to coach these athletes."

The women's team qualified for the State Championship competition for the first time in almost a decade. Senior Helen Ribas, already accepted into the United States Military Academy at West Point, ran a 5K in 20:07, the sixth best time in school history.













In October 2023, Archbishop McCarthy alum Nick Castellanos, Class of 2010, set a major league baseball record by becoming the first player to hit multiple home runs in consecutive postseason games, helping the Philadelphia Phillies defeat the Atlanta Braves in the National League Divisional Series.

When asked to recall his most prized memory from his time playing baseball at McCarthy, *Nick said it was helping the Mavericks win their first state championship in 2010.* As a senior, Nick was named Gatorade Player of the Year for the state of Florida, finishing the season with a batting average of .542.




# GOLF



The 2023 Men's and Women's Golf teams enjoyed yet another outstanding season, with the women's team taking their 15th District title and the men's team winning their 12th. The golf teams played in tournaments throughout Florida and traveled to Arizona, coming away with a total of 6 victories in invitationals. The Lady Mavericks finished 7th in the State tournament, and the men placed 4th.

Senior Brett Moore won the individual Regional championship with a round of 65; he also broke the McCarthy school record for an 18-hole round by shooting a 64. Ryan Lopez set a school record for shooting the most rounds under par—8—in a single season.



Given the administration's vigorous support and Coach Phillips' unbridled enthusiasm, there's no doubt that Archbishop McCarthy's golf program will continue to be one of the state's best.












# McCarthy's Academic All-Stars





These words are the foundation upon which the school's mission is built—to form tomorrow's leaders by providing a Roman Catholic experience in all facets of school life, including Atmosphere, Academics, Activities, the Arts, and Athletics. "Bringing Jesus to our student faithful is a great honor," says Theology Department Chairperson Mr. Richard Grebenc.

Campus Ministry and Theology teacher, concurs, observing that "the activities at McCarthy High School play a pivotal role in the Catholic formation of students. Grounded in Christian inspiration, faith reflection, and fidelity to Christian teachings, these activities instill a deep understanding of faith." School Masses, daily prayer, and participation in the sacraments "ignite a spiritual connection," Deacon Ulloa emphasizes, "that cultivates a commitment to the Gospel's call to promote social responsibility."






Among the most treasured faith

Not only do these student-led retreats strengthen participants' faith life, Mr. Caprio points out, they also "improve their self-confidence and motivation; student leaders become mentors of faith, compassion, and courage to their peers." Each class has a retreat that is designed for their age level. Freshmen attend Genesis, which is coordinated by Mr. Fredy Perez and Mr. Chris Covone. "Genesis is the beginning," Mr. Perez enthuses. "It is an opportunity for ninthgraders to grow in faith and explore the options available to them in the Peer Ministry program." The three-day Antioch retreats are for sophomores, who travel to the remote retreat facility Cedarkirk for the first time and are led by junior Peer Ministers. Planning for the junior class retreat, Transfiguration, begins

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


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
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
